Missiology includes the study of theological method, social and cultural analysis, systematic theology, church history, apologetics, public theology, theology of mission and evangelism.



Walking on Country

The year started by giving those who spent four days in February Walking on Country much to ponder. Five candidates, two family members, a colleague from Uniting Communities, and Rosemary went to Njarrindjeri country and were graciously hosted by Uncle Marshall, Uncle Bruce and Aunty Kathy at Kalparrin, Uncle Tom and the Mob at Camp Coorong, and Uncle Clyde at Raukin. We were told many stories dreaming stories and stories of colonizing history - learned how to weave baskets, learned where to find bush tucker and medicine, heard of projects bringing hope for change, and walked the land along the amazing Coorong. Anu nginti!

Tracy Spencer facilitated and organised the whole trip and did a superb job of guiding us through a journey of decolonisation.

Aunty Denise provided the important glue between cultures and encouraged contextual theologising. Both challenged us and helped us to reflect deeply and modelled an openness and care that welcomed honesty and growth.

Lou Smalbil, husband of MOW Jo, wrote the following reflection in response:

God looked down upon the lands of Australia and saw that things were not well with the Land and its People and something had to be done.

God looked more closely and saw a Mob of good people who each had stories to tell,

but they were scattered across the Land, so they were brought together.

People from the coastal area of Queensland, from the lands of the Snowy Mountains, from across the waters to New Zealand, and from the red sands of the interiors, and they came from the southern coastal areas and the plains of the hills. They were black and white, students and teachers, young and old, male and female but they had all come to learn and experience the ways of the land.

They listened to the spirits of the great River, the Coast and of the Lakes.

They learned about the past, the care of the surroundings, the injustices placed upon the First People of the lands.

They also learnt that the past could not be changed but the present and future is where change can take place.

God saw this and called upon the Creator to gather these people, and with one big hand the Creator picked up these people and moulded them into a tall strong tree that produced beautiful brightly coloured flowers and a sweet tasting fruit that attracts the birds and animals of the area.

The seeds of the fruit are carried far and wide some falling onto fertile soils others not, but in time more trees grow and more seeds are produced, all learning and carrying away the stories of the good people and in time the Land becomes well and also the People of the Land. Then God looked down and said, "all is good."
